Chautauqua Opportunities, Inc. hosts a 24/7 DADS program, where facilitators support dads in their goals to grow and learn strategies for stronger parenting over six weeks. In addition to teaching the curriculum, facilitators also spend a great deal of time listening to the dads' stories and learning from their real-life situations. All of that culminates on graduation day when the Facilitators witness the dads holding up their certificates with their families in attendance. While we significantly impact the dads, they also impact the community.

## **Monthly Myth Series:**



Myth: Childhood poverty is synonymous with broken homes and bad families.

Reality: Statistics show that households led by a single parent are more likely to be below the poverty line than 2-parent homes. But the dangerous myth is that a single-parent-headed household is a broken home. All families, no matter their structure, are valuable. Some studies show that poverty factors into decisions to delay marriage, which may help explain the single-parent statistic.

# Citizen's Committee for Children of New York: Child and Family Well-being in NYS

Child and family well-being encompasses economic and housing security, health and educational opportunities, and age-specific and community-based supports. Based on the composite index of 18 indicators of well-being, New York's counties are ranked from 1 (greatest barriers to well-being) to 62 (fewest barriers to well-being) in each domain and overall. This approach offers a starting point for identifying inequalities across counties to inform an equitable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. While there are important differences between counties, barriers to well-being exist in every county, and so too do opportunities to overcome them.

# Study Finds New York State's Excluded Worker Fund was Successful in Supporting Families

Immigration Research Initiative and Urban Institute released the results of an innovative survey that measured the successes and shortfalls of the NYS Excluded Worker Fund. The EWF was a \$2.1 billion program that allowed 130,000 immigrants without work authorization and some others who fell between the gaps of federal aid to get unemployment compensation if they lost work during the pandemic recession. The survey shows that recipients significantly improved in areas including meeting urgent basic needs, family well-being, and community engagement.

# National Council on Aging: Funding Announcement - COVID-19 and Influenza Vaccine Uptake Initiative

The National Council on Aging (NCOA) has received a \$50 million grant from the U.S. Administration for Community Living to implement a nationwide campaign to ensure older adults and people with disabilities get the latest COVID and flu vaccines. NCOA will provide funding and technical assistance to hundreds of diverse community-based organizations, enabling them to conduct tailored outreach, host vaccine clinics, and offer services many older adults need to get vaccinated, such as transportation and assistance in scheduling appointments.

# U.S. Census Bureau: U.S. Population Shows Growth in 2022

After a historically low rate of change between 2020 and 2021, the U.S. resident population increased by 0.4%, or 1,256,003, to 333,287,557 in 2022, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's Vintage 2022 national and state population estimates and components of change. The report provides information on population growth by state.
