NYSCAA will partner with four Community Action Agencies, Community Action Programs Cayuga/Seneca, Cortland County Community Action Program, Inc.(CAPCO), Mohawk Valley Community Action Agency, Inc.(MVCAA), and Community Action for Wyoming County, as well as with the Central New York Diaper Bank and Every Bottom Covered in Western NY.

I am also proud to share that NYSCAA's Board Vice-President and Executive Director of Chautauqua Opportunities, Inc., Diane Hewitt-Johnson, was selected to the CAPLAW Board of Directors. The application process for CAPLAW's board is competitive. Congratulations, Diane; we are proud to have you represent New York State Community Action Agencies on this prestigious board.



## Community Action of Orleans and Genesee Renames Community Store and Adds Services

Community Action of Orleans and Genesee renamed the community store to reflect the new services being offered. The "Main Street Corner Thrift, Gifts and More Store" now provides a Telehealth pod for veterans to connect to the VA Western New York Healthcare System. In addition to the traditional Thrift store offerings, the shop runs a credit recovery program for graduating students, a job development program, the veterans' pod, and a prom dress giveaway program. The store also hosts a Young Entrepreneur's Corner and party rentals. The Young Entrepreneur's Corner is designed to support young people with the ambition to run their own business, allowing them to run a cash register, develop customer service skills, and sell their unique products. Executive Director Renee Hungerford says there are more additions still to come.



### October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October was first declared as National Domestic Violence Awareness Month in 1989. Since then, October has been a time to acknowledge domestic violence survivors and be a voice for its victims. Domestic violence is prevalent in every community, and affects all people regardless of age, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, gender, race, religion, or nationality. Physical violence is often accompanied by emotionally abusive and controlling behavior as part of a much larger, systematic pattern of dominance and control. Domestic violence can result in physical injury, psychological trauma, and even death. The devastating consequences of domestic violence can cross generations and last a lifetime.

The National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) has compiled a list of helpful resources for parents and caregivers, children and teens, mental health providers, child welfare workers, law enforcement professionals, educators and school staff, and policy makers.

### U.S. Census Releases 2022 Poverty Data

The US Census Bureau released several reports related to poverty and income. The reports find the Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM), which includes government assistance, increased to 12.4% in 2022 from 7.8% in 2021, according to U.S. Census Bureau data released today. The 2022 poverty rate was also 0.6 percentage points higher than the pre-pandemic rate of 11.8% in 2019.

The Census Bureau also released data related to healthcare coverage and child poverty rates, which more than doubled from 2021 with the expiration of the expanded child tax credits.

# U.S. Census Bureau: 2022 Income Inequality Decreased for First Time Since 2007

Income inequality declined in 2022 for the first time since 2007, due primarily to declines in real median household income at middle and top income brackets, according to the Income in the United States: 2022 report released in September.

U.S. Census Bureau data from the Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplement (CPS ASEC) show that the declines in real income at the middle and top of the income distribution resulted in lower income inequality as measured by the Gini index — a common measure of income inequality. Income inequality refers to how evenly income or income growth is distributed across the population. Higher income inequality represents less equal income distribution or growth.

# U.S. Census Bureau: Median Household Income After Taxes Fell 8.8% in 2022

Real median household income after taxes fell 8.8% to \$64,240 from 2021 to 2022 and the poverty rate after taxes as measured by the Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM) increased 59% to 12.4%. These significant changes in after-tax income and poverty rates of U.S. households were much larger than the annual changes in before-tax income and poverty, according to U.S. Census Bureau data released in September.

# U.S. Census Bureau: Supplemental Poverty Measure in 2022 Higher Than Pre-Pandemic Level

The Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM), which includes government assistance, increased to 12.4% in 2022 from 7.8% in 2021, according to U.S. Census Bureau data released today. The 2022 poverty rate was also 0.6 percentage points higher than the pre-pandemic rate of 11.8% in 2019.

This was the first increase in the overall SPM rate since 2010. The increase was largely the result of the end of stimulus payments and tax credits in effect during the COVID-19 pandemic that had lowered the SPM rate to its lowest level ever in 2021. The changes had a particularly pronounced impact on the poverty rates of children.
